

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Ground Transportation

- Interstate 70 runs through the Town of Limon, with a daily average of vehicles traveling on it counts just over 12,000 in each direction; east and west. Denver Metro Area (pop. > 2,488,000), via I-70 westbound, is just 70 miles away and Kansas is about an hour east-bound.
- U.S. Highway 24 runs to the town's southwest towards Colorado Springs (pop. > 360,000) which is 74 miles west of Limon.
- U.S. Highway 40 runs along U.S. Highway 287 southward towards Kit Carson, Colorado before continuing east into Kansas on its own.
- U.S. Highway 287 enters the Town of Limon from the south and continues to the north-west along Interstate 70. This Highway is a route on the Ports-to-Plains Corridor; which continues south to the border of Mexico through Ports of Entry via Del Rio, Eagle Pass and Laredo, Texas.
- Colorado State Highway 71, runs north from Limon towards Brush and Ft. Morgan (pop. > 16,000) about an hour drive. This Highway is also a route on the Ports-to-Plains Corridor; which continues north to the border of Canada through Ports of Entry in Montana and North Dakota. Highway 71 also runs south to Ordway, about an hour drive and then on to Pueblo, Colorado via U.S. Highway 50.
- Colorado State Highway 86, just a couple miles west of Limon off of I-70, runs directly west into Castle Rock, Colorado (pop. > 44,000); about 67 miles (near the middle between the Denver Metro Area and Colorado Springs),
- Freight Rail line operations both west and east bound out of Limon, operated by both UPRR Railway Company (Class I) and Kyle Railroad (Regional).

Air Transportation

- Denver International Airport (DIA) is located about an hour to the north-west of Limon. DIA handles international, national and regional direct flight transportation of goods and passengers with most of the major carriers.
- Colorado Springs Airport (COS) is located about an hour to the south-west of Limon. COS offers both national and regional air services of passengers and goods. National direct passenger flights include: Dallas/Ft. Worth, Houston, Los Angeles, Minneapolis/St. Paul, Salt Lake City and San Francisco.

 Limon Regional General Aviation Airport (LIC). This general aviation airport is located at 5,365 feet of elevation and runway 16/34 is constructed of concrete 60 feet wide and 4,700 feet in length with a concrete partial parallel taxiway. This runway meets or exceeds the minimum landing requirements needed for under 12,500 pound corporate jets.

Economic Development Incentives

- Limon is included in the East Central Enhanced Enterprise Zone. Colorado Enterprise Zone legislation provide state tax incentives to businesses located in the zone, particularly for new or expanded businesses. The State also has enhanced credits to new businesses within rural areas (http://www.colorado.gov):
 - Investment Tax Credit;
 - New Business Facility Job Credits;
 - State Sales and Use Tax Exemption for Manufacturing Equipment;
 - Research and Development Tax Credit;
 - Tax Credit for the Rehabilitation of Vacant Commercial Buildings;
 - Qualified Job Training Program Investment Credit;
 - Qualified School-to-Career Investment Credit.
- Prairie Development Corporation (PDC) is a nonprofit economic development organization created by the East Central Council of Local Governments (http:// www.prairiedevelopment.com) to provide assistance with:
 - Low Interest Business Loans:
 - Housing Loans.
- Economic Development Incentives from the Town of Limon, if Eligibility Requirements are met, may include:
 - Tax Refund based on Capital Investment;
 - Town owned land at a discounted purchase price;
 - Grants for Infrastructure Improvements;
 - Industrial Revenue Bonds:
 - Tax Increment Financing (TIF);
 - Special Improvement District.
